# LAC to Vanuatu

In 2015 Vanuatu was hit by Cyclone Pam which damaged many homes, villages and communities. This is known as the worst natural disaster Vanuatu has ever experienced. On the 6th-20th of July, 24 students, staff and parents will be travelling to Vanuatu for a two week mission trip. We will be working on Santos Island where we will build a water system and help a community receive a fresh water supply. We will also be constructing hygiene latrines and will be teaching the community about sanitation and hygiene procedures. We are also willing to help paint a high school.



For this project the team will be a part of the Adventist Development and Relief Association (ADRA) who will be helping us organise our travels, accommodation and overall wellbeing while in Vanuatu.

As some of you may have heard major airlines such as Air New Zealand have stopped flying to Port Vila, Vanuatu due to problems with the runway. Thanks to many prayers we have managed to re-book our flights, but this has meant that our individual cost for the trip has increased to \$2,944 including the travel fee and project fee. The team understands that they have a big task ahead but are willing to put in the hard work and sacrifice to get them to Vanuatu.

In terms of fundraising, the team has been blessed to receive a contract from New World Supermarket. Students, staff and parents worked several nights during the summer break to raise money and at the moment the team is doing 5am-7am shifts at New World. By sacrificing a few hours of sleep you can see the determination and servant heart the team has towards helping Vanuatu.



Mr Paul, the trip coordinator, has kindly created a website (link below) where each team member has set up a page explaining why they personally want to go to Vanuatu. On this page donators are able to give money towards the project fee of \$1,900 to any desired team member.

In the months leading up to the trip the team will be organising fundraising events. Our first one is a mufti day which will happen on the 7th of April which be a chance for the students to give.

There will be clothing, household items, furniture, books, toys, cake stalls, a bouncy castle for the kids and much much more. This will be a chance for staff, parents and friends to donate towards the trip and have an awesome day socialising with the LAC body. So come along and support the team!

# 'The Purpose of Education'

"Every human being, created in the image of God, is endowed with a power akin to that of the Creator – individuality, power to think and to do."

"It is the work of true education to develop this power, to train the youth to be thinkers, and not mere reflectors of other men's thought."

- Each of us was created to think for ourselves and not to safely follow worldly instructions.
- That we are called to act on what we believe.
- That what we believe will grow as we desire Him, and that there is no end point. We are expected to keep learning.

As a teacher, and a parent, it strikes me that I have a responsibility to my students and children to live these ideas. I have a responsibility to myself if I am truly seeking the truth.

Merely teaching information without encouraging a desire to question why, denies our students purpose and meaning in their lives. Imagine what we may learn, but only if we ask the question. We need to encourage

the questions and not feel obliged to have an answer. He is the answer.

# **Pou Whenua:**Anchoring LAC's Identity

LAC has embarked on a journey to erect a pou whenua (pou) that acknowledges our country's unique cultural heritage whilst representing the story of LAC – past and present.

Pou are carved, wooden posts that traditionally marked places of significance, and generally acknowledge or reflect the association between the people (tāngata), the land (whenua), and the spiritual (wairua). Last year, our two carvers extensively researched the history of LAC and through discussions with current staff and students have drawn up a contemporary/traditional design that tells our story of "growing together as one in Christ".

Towards the end of 2015, we were blessed to be given a fallen and ancient Totara log from the quarry at the end of Walkers Road, and through the hands and goodwill of others, had it transported, and cut so that it was ready to carve. As carving has started and we continue with our Pou, we hope to soon invite, staff, students and whānau to visit whilst the men are carving.

### **NZ Motocross**

On Sunday, February 28, Jaequon Goodrick (Y12) competed in Round 2 of the NZ Senior Motocross Championship held at Flipps Track, Himitangi.

Jaequon qualified 27th out of 49 riders in the MX2 class after having a crash during the practice. In the first race he finished 29th and 25th in the 2nd race. The conditions of the track were extremely rough and the most testing of any track in New Zealand. This contributed to Jaequon getting a severe arm bump



and unable to finish race 3. Jaequon did incredibly well as this was his first race in a senior event, to get the placing he did out of the 49 top riders at senior level while still being a junior rider. To put it in perspective, the other juniors, including the top 5 junior riders in New Zealand, were placing around the same positions and doing the same lap times as Jaequon.
