## International Students’ Department

“As the Head of Department (HOD) of the International Students’ Department at Longburn Adventist College (LAC) my role is to ensure the academic success of all international students. This also includes managing the welfare of our international students, monitoring and reporting of their progress to their parents, and liaising with other school staff.

There are things that are paramount to LAC: the safety and welfare of our students, academic achievement, and most importantly our special character. Because LAC is a Seventh-day Adventist school, spiritual education is part of the core curriculum and is compulsory for all students. LAC provides a safe, friendly environment to learn English and other curriculum areas.

Here at LAC we offer a wide range of NCEA and New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) approved academic and vocational subjects. NCEA (National Certificate of Educational Achievement) is the main secondary school qualification in New Zealand. Be reassured, NZQA and NCEA qualifications are well-recognised overseas.

The academic support given to our international students includes preparation for NCEA qualifications and University Entrance, ESOL classes, and Subject support classes. At LAC our teaching standards are high and with small class sizes students will enjoy high levels of personal attention.

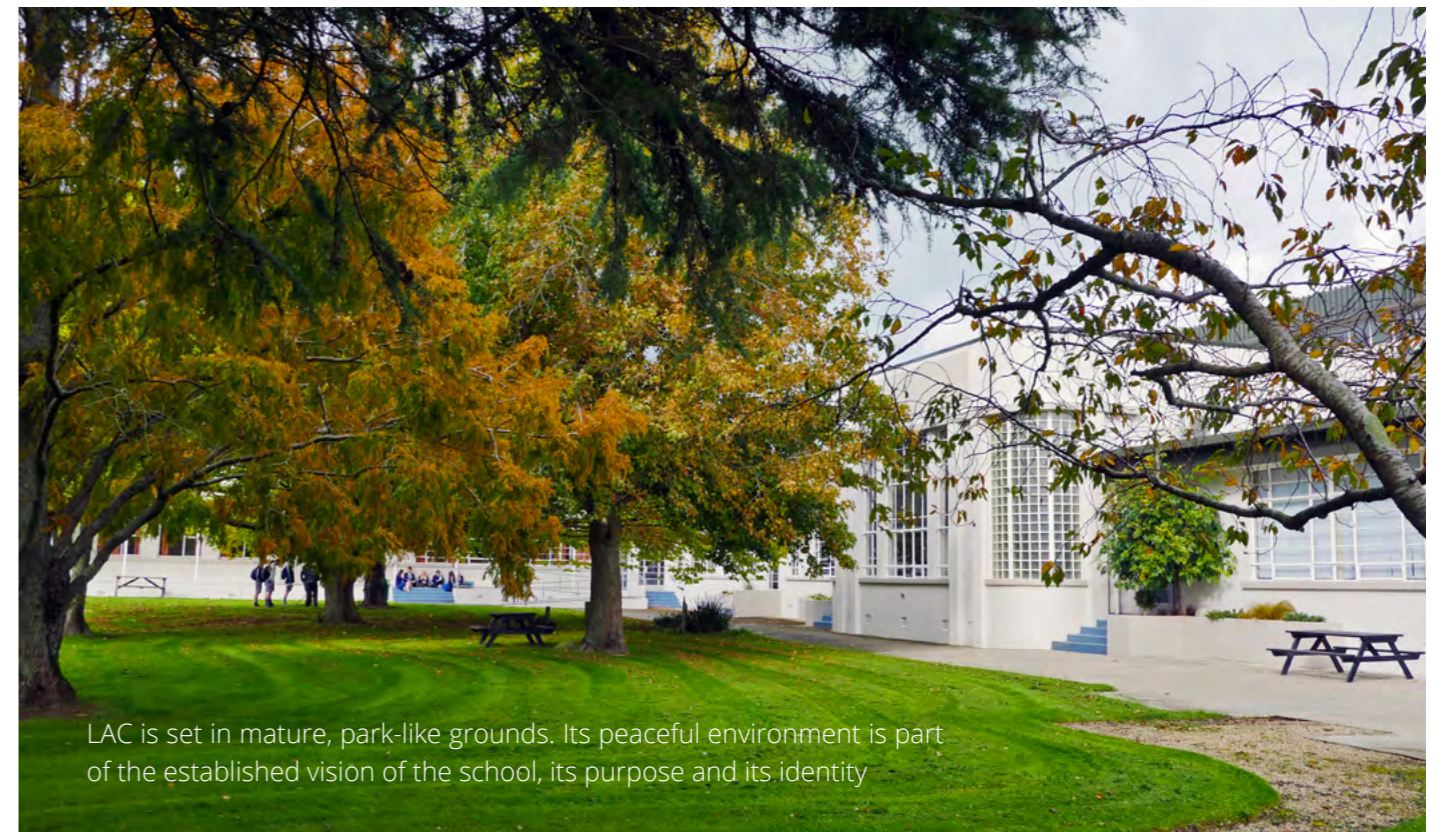

# New Zealand Education & NCEA

The National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) is the main national qualification for secondary school students in New Zealand.

NCEA is three certificates: it can be awarded at Levels 1, 2 and 3. Students usually begin studying for their NCEA Level 1 in Year 11 and continue through Years 12 and 13 (from ages 15 through to 18).

Many vocational qualifications are also offered in secondary schools. These include, for example, the National Certificate of Tourism and the National Certificate in Computing.

## NCEA is recognised by overseas universities

NCEA is New Zealand's national school-leaver qualification and is well-recognised overseas. It is highly-regarded by employers and used for selection by universities, both in New Zealand and in other countries.

## Entrance to Australian Universities

Australia recognises NCEA Level 3 as broadly equivalent to its Senior Secondary Certificates of Education, and accepts it for applications for entry to Australian universities.

Completing NCEA Level 3 is the equivalent of completing the standard Australian Year 12 programme, and normally satisfies the prerequisite for application.

Each year in early January, the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) aggregates NCEA Level 3 results for students seeking entry to Australian universities. NZQA convert the results to a percentile scale called the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) and send this information to the Tertiary Admissions Centres. The conversion allows New Zealand students to be treated equitably with Australian students for tertiary entry and selection purposes.

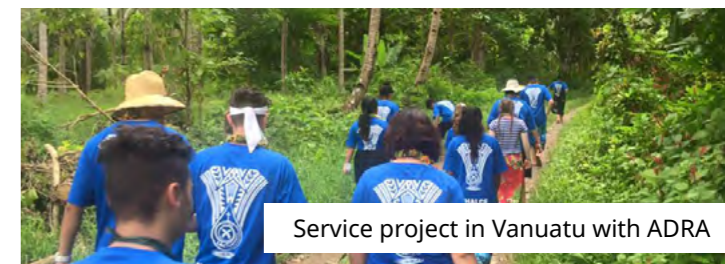

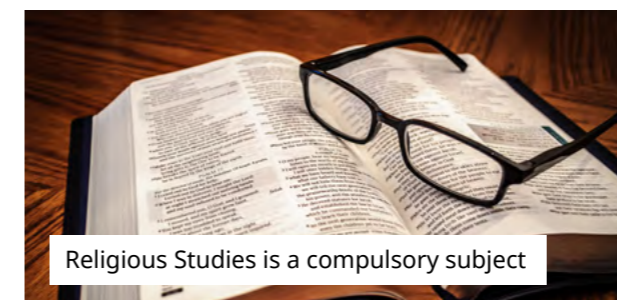

# 1. Christian Values in Action

Religious Studies is a compulsory subject

Religious Studies or Bible as it is referred to, is a compulsory subject for all year levels. Rather than being a course that dictates an expected truth, it allows students to seek truth for themselves. Events like 'Week of Worship', Chapel programmes, rollmark devotionals, testimonies and collective service projects enable each of us to put our words into action.

Christian Religious Education (CRE) is where some of our senior students are given the opportunity to teach Bible stories and the Gospel of Jesus in a state primary school. For many of those students, it is a significant experience. One where there is a realisation that not only do I have something to offer but people will place trust in what I have to say and do. In addition, serving others has real value and that Christ's example is relevant to each of us.

## 2. Digital Technology

Technology is a vital tool which plays a major part in what we do today. It is hard to imagine jobs in the future not containing a significant amount of technology. Therefore, we need to prepare our students accordingly. The IT strategic vision at LAC talks about relationships, ethics and learning, in that order. All use of technology needs to be in a context of the right values, caring about others and behaving with integrity.

LAC is a 'Bring Your Own Device' school, with all teachers and students using a Google platform in the learning process.

Real-time reporting has allowed parents to view what feedback and feed-forward teachers are sharing with their children. The online Portal, where real-time reporting can be found, allows parents to have access to a range of information.

The use of technology in the classroom has allowed a number of initiatives to take place. An example is in the Junior school where we are developing an online learning platform. The teaching team have also completed their digital passport and are preparing for the implementation of the Digital Curriculum.

## 3. Career Pathways

Preparing our young people for the future is about having a hope for the future and a pathway for life after LAC. There are a range of initiatives that we, as a school, are excited about. We are about to implement a 'Work Ready Passport' (WRP). This passport will require all students to achieve that will make them 'work ready'. This will include having a driver's licence, experiencing an actual job interview, and completing a CV amongst other things. WRP has been created in consultation with Talent Central. This organisation exists to bring young people and potential employers together in the job market.



LAC is in the process of developing relationships with significant employers in our community. A good example is Fonterra, who not only meet with our students as a group but also with individual students who wish to discuss the possibilities that Fonterra offer. In some cases, this has led to a representative of Fonterra mentoring individual students. This kind of relationship is hugely empowering for a young adult.

Our careers advisor interviews all senior students and we are small enough to be able to work with each individual student and their story.



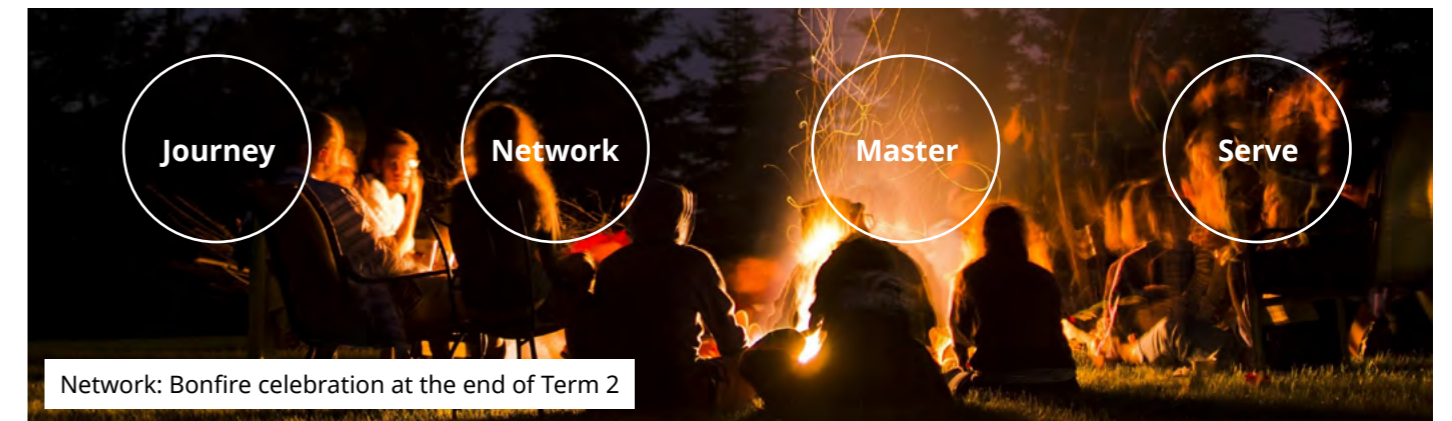
## 4. Invictus Wellbeing Programme

Invictus is a wellbeing programme introduced for Year 9 to 11 students that consists of 4 threads: Journey, Network, Master and Serve.

These threads work towards creating a resilience, purpose and a hope for the future. So many young people today are sadly unable to cope with the day-to-day rigours of life.

Ultimately, we want all students at LAC to have a joy for life. This joy is born out of an awareness of what is truly important and that we ourselves are able to achieve great things.

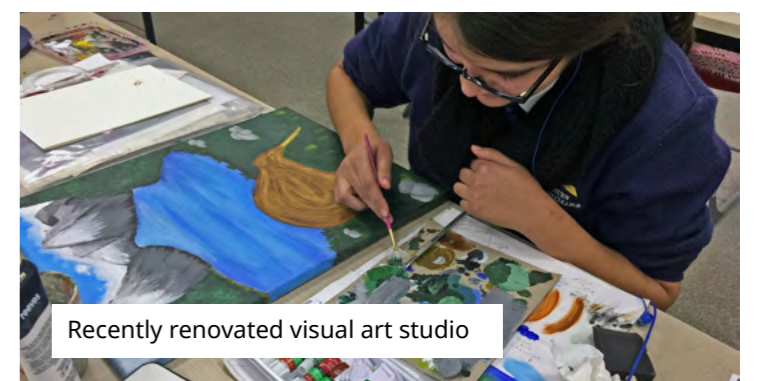


## 5. Specialist Learning Opportunities

One of the advantages for LAC students, particularly Year 7 and 8, is that they have access to a range of specialist learning opportunities. The recently built hospitality suite allows students to work in a commercial kitchen context and gain qualifications up to NCEA Level 3.

Building Construction is also offered up to NCEA Level 3. This course allows students to prepare for carpentry trades and building trades. This large space is well-resourced and the school has enjoyed consistent success in annual regional competitions which include tertiary providers.

The Visual Arts studio allows senior students to complete photography, design and painting. The facility enjoys all the necessary technology, including a spray booth and an outdoor space that gives students opportunities to explore.

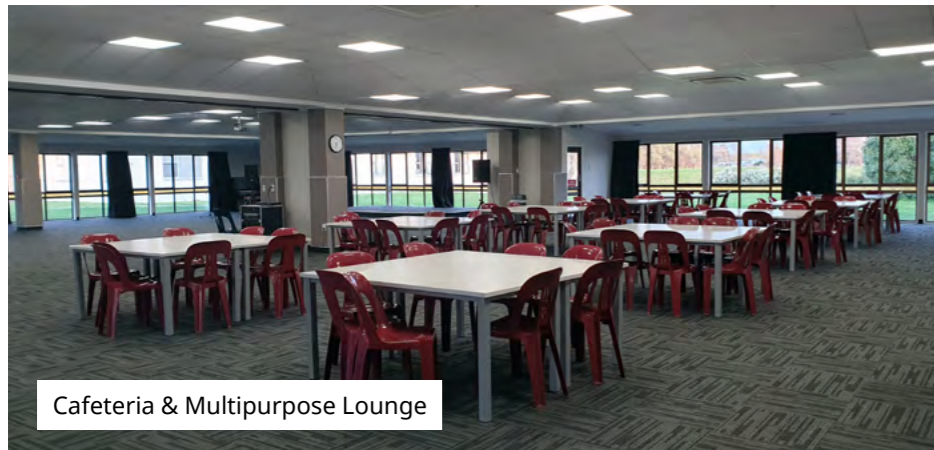

Payment Options: Caregivers may pay up-front or by Termly instalments to be able to apply for a student visa:

### \*Attendance Dues & ISPMML (International Student Property Major Maintenance Levies)

These Dues are used to fund capital works in the college and are paid directly to NZ Seventh-day Adventist Schools Association.

At LAC we have been blessed with the property work completed by the proprietors and the extra teaching space they have provided over the years. They do not receive any government funding for this, so your Attendance Dues are vital to enable the proprietors to do this work for us.





# International Boarding Fees

Boarders are housed in two dormitory buildings on the Longburn Adventist College Campus. The girls' and boys' dormitories accommodate students in double (shared) and single rooms. The cafeteria, which includes a fully equipped industrial kitchen, is located in a separate building within walking distance of the dormitories. Within the cafeteria building, is the dining room and multipurpose/lounge area.

Other student facilities for the Longburn Adventist College boarders include a tennis court, basketball court, athletics ground, and access to the LAC gym and music suite. There is a covered area for storage of bicycles.

<b>Activities Fee</b> incl. transportation costs	Boarding includes a range of activities during the week and on weekends.
