#### **BIOLOGY TRIP**

On the 26th of May, the Year 12 Biology class enjoyed a field trip to Totara Reserve. The focus of the day was to collect data on the distribution pattern of epiphytes (kaha kaha) growing at different heights on their host trees (kahikatea).

The relationship between these two trees is an interesting one of commensalism not parasitism. The epiphytes have the luxury of living high up in the canopy and emergent layers of the stratified forest without having to take root in the forest floor and taking time and energy growing to the desired height where the available light is plentiful. Instead they perch in the branches of the host tree, where they do no harm to the host tree while gaining the benefit of the light. An excellent example of structural adaptation for survival! It was great to get out of the classroom to be practically involved in the ecology aspect of biology. The weather was kind and we were able to collect rich data for analysis back at school.

Nomination papers will also be available at the school office. The school will send those on to CES for processing upon receipt from candidates.


Nominations close on Friday 5th August at 12 noon. We look forward to your participation in this process.

#### **TOUGH GUY AND GAL EVENT**

On Friday 27th of May, thirteen of our students were up bright and early to travel down to the Tough Guy & Tough Gal event in Wellington, along with many other schools from various areas in the Lower North Island. When we left LAC in the school van, the sky was still covered in its early morning darkness, not yet awake, and during the two-hour drive to our destination we were blessed with a beautiful sunrise. Unfortunately, the sun didn't remain and we had to make do with a grey and misty day instead.

Although the weather wasn't beneficial to the course – if anything making it more challenging – that didn't stop the courage these students had and the determination for those who completed the course the previous year to be better. A lot of energy and hype were set along the way with some boys building each other's confidence up; laughing and singing the whole way down. The venue was crowded with almost a thousand students with bibs on their chest and in sports gear ready to run through the muddy, slippery, steep track. When it was time to begin, the announcer called for one-hundred students at a time to make their way to the starting line and be ready to run while the next hundred students pushed up behind them to be ready. Our group was amongst the third lot to get away, all aspiring to complete this challenge with a quick time.

When the announcer said, "go!" everyone in our group took off, mindful of the decorated scenery that was plotting to slow them down. At first some would assume, "it's not so hard", but the mud in the grass and dirt underneath their feet proved them otherwise, especially when running through turns. Obstacles included climbing over medium to high fences jumping from the top and landing (sometimes slipping) on the ground below, and a lot of crawling through tunnels, barb-wire and electric fence wires (with students fearful of getting shocked and zapped if not low enough out of reach). Running through the forest challenged arguably everyone's balance with the mud all around, running up the hills that came along took a lot of effort with how exhausted many were at that point, but perhaps the most challenging features on the course that students talked about was the mud water and having to climb a long hill with a rope. Before going on the course, everyone taped their shoes so the harsh and heavy depths of the mud didn't pull them off, but some found even with their footwear taped, the muddy water still came close to pulling off their shoes. The rope on the hill tugged at everyone's muscles, some say it felt like hours to make it to the top, and some wished, at that moment, they never attended!

Many fellow LAC students passed each other along the course, joking around as they went. Many of us were tired and exhausted by the time we crossed the finish line, but after showering all the mud off our bodies and getting some well earned food into us, we were ready for the journey back to school.

#### NETWORK BONFIRE



#### **GO KART SUCCESS**

Xander Pringle, a Year 8 student at LAC, participates in the Junior Clubsport 120 kart class as part of the local Manawatu Kartsport club based in Longburn. Having stumbled upon karting at Daytona Indoor Raceway a year ago, he was identified as a young talent and encouraged to look at outdoor karting. Trying to find a way to race within a reasonable budget, he was the first Clubsport Junior 120 to hit the track just over 12 months ago. The field is still growing and is becoming more competitive, a great option for 10–15 year olds looking for some fast fun. Xander competes regularly at the Manawatu and Wellington Clubsport tracks, having successfully been on the podium at every race so far. He has also maintained his speed indoors at Daytona holding one of the top ten fastest lap times each month this year; and at the age of 13, he is also the youngest!

Earlier this term Xander raced at the Manawatu Club Day in the rain, on a very wet track, in changeable conditions that he hadn't encountered before. He managed to cross the line in his first three heats in 3rd place, and took home 1st place in his fourth heat following a very competitive and challenging battle for the top three positions. Unfortunately his final race ended with a DNF (did not finish), but Xander had enough success over the course of the day to be awarded 3rd overall for his class.

Karting for Xander is more than just speed on the track. He has learnt to serve as part of a club, being involved in working bees, flag marshalling, in the kitchen at big race meets, and has become more confident at public speaking. He has also gained many friends, young and old, and is an enthusiastic helper in the pits with his mechanical skills and strength, he's particularly helpful with getting tyres on and off in a hurry between changes in weather.
